



In just under 11 months, 84 certificates have been awarded by Vincennes University as a result of workers successfully completing industrial maintenance training classes at the Jackson County Learning Center in Seymour.

It was Nov. 9, 2023, that a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held in Seymour to mark the opening of electrical and mechanical training classes being offered by Vincennes. The training was made possible by the state of Indiana's READI grant program and the support of area manufacturing companies and the Seymour Redevelopment Commission (RDC).

According to Brian Sawyers, instructor/site director, industrial maintenance training for Vincennes University in Jackson County, 10 classes had been completed by the end of September — four basic electrical, four basic mechanical, one intermediate mechanical and one intermediate electrical — and 84 certificates had been presented.

Those numbers will grow as the fourth quarter sees another intermediate mechanical course scheduled for graduation on Oct. 9 and a basic mechanical course that will be complete by Nov. 5. Still to come before the end of the year: Intermediate electrical (starting Oct. 28 and graduating Dec. 16) and basic electrical (starting Nov. 7 and graduating Dec. 19).

It is hoped that additional courses will be added as part of the state of Indiana's READI 2.0 grant program. That would follow the initial READI program funding from 2022 when \$450,000 was granted to support the training. The Seymour RDC matched those funds with additional funding coming from the Aisin companies of Jackson County, Valeo and Cummins. Under READI 2.0, advanced classes for mechanical and electrical maintenance are among the requested programs seeking funding from the South Central Indiana Talent Region's application.

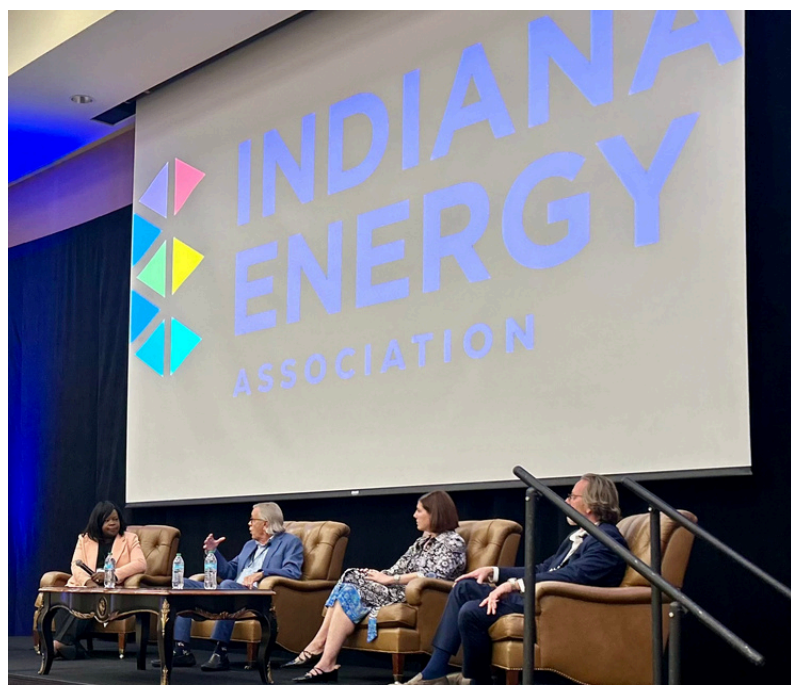
NEW BOARD MEMBERS FOR JCIDC

JCIDC Workforce Director Jackie Hill, Jackson County Chamber Director Dan Robison, Seymour Main Street Executive Director Jaylyn Stam and Brownstown Ewing Main Street board member Arann Banks visited local schools in late August to talk about the high school business planning competition Maverick Challenge Jackson County.

Maverick Challenge began in 2008 in Bartholomew County, and Jackson County joined the program in 2011. Last year, Bartholomew County ended the program, but Jackson County leaders kept it going in the county with a partnership between JCIDC, Jackson County Chamber, Seymour Main Street and Brownstown Ewing Main Street and funding partner JCBank.

In September, students worked on their presentations and pitched their business ideas. Next, they will create a 3- to 5-minute video and hear from classroom speakers about presentation, video, financials and marketing. From November to January, they will be paired with a mentor to help them.

The 10 finalists will be announced in mid-February and give oral presentations March 5 with \$7,000 up for grabs.

New this year, the winner will be one of the six finalists in the SPARK Tank competition, which awards \$10,000. The winner and potentially others from Maverick Challenge also can enter the state's Innovate WithIN competition, which has a regional competition in the spring and finals in June with the ultimate winner receiving \$25,000.



MANUFACTURING TO BE IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Celebrated annually on the first Friday in October with events continuing throughout the month and beyond, MFG Day is a national grassroots movement that demonstrates the reality and future of modern manufacturing careers. Thousands of companies and educational institutions nationwide are invited to open their doors to students, parents, educators and community leaders.

The Manufacturing Institute initiative empowers manufacturers to come together and address their collective challenges and build excitement about manufacturing careers to help their communities and future generations thrive.

On Oct. 11, MFG Day will be celebrated in Jackson County. Nearly 200 students from the six county high schools will meet at Cummins Seymour Engine Plant in the morning, where they will attend workshops led by employees of Cummins, Pet Supplies Plus, Aisin USA Mfg. Inc., Lannett Co. Inc. and Valeo. Then in the afternoon, students will be at one of the participating companies for lunch, a tour and a hands-on activity.

The inaugural Manufacturing Day in Jackson County was in 2019. Nearly 130 Seymour High School students participated in the event organized by JCIDC that was designed to introduce young people in the community to the manufacturing sector and career opportunities and demonstrate the contributions manufacturing makes to the local economy. Since that first year in Jackson County, the event has expanded to include the other county high schools.

Manufacturing Day, now known as MFG Day, has been observed nationally since 2012 to inspire the next generation of manufacturers.

“We are the future.” THREE LOCAL HIGH SCHOOLS FEATURE ALL-GIRLS ROBOTICS TEAMS

Launched in June 2022, #GirlsLeadSTEM is a national awareness campaign to elevate the diverse voices of young women and girls in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math).

Through a collective voice, #GirlsLeadSTEM celebrates the girls who lead their STEM journeys and raise their voices to inspire and share their perspectives on what’s needed to close the gaps in STEM.

October of that year was the inaugural #GirlsLeadSTEM Month, and that has continued each year since.

In Jackson County, girls at three local high schools are showing how they lead STEM, particularly with robotics.

This school year, freshmen Jazzlyn Cravens and Dafne Dominguez, sophomore Taylor LeBlanc and juniors Hannah Baker and Nicole Ray make up Seymour High School’s Team 31330A. There also are sophomore Alyssa Fields and junior Mallorie Misamore on teams with boys, and eighth-grader Lillian Westmoreland is on a team with two boys that’s going to compete at the high school level.

At Brownstown Central High School, sophomores Allie Barlow, Carmen Herzner and Lauren King are on the same team for the second year in a row. Their official team name is Team 65449B, but they call themselves Furry Fighters.

Trinity Lutheran High School has freshmen Belle Kiewit, Naomi McKinley and Adela Meyer on a team together. They are Team 1483D, but their nickname is Perseus.

Also in October, International Day of the Girl is being celebrated locally with the inaugural Jackson County Girl Powered Workshop. It will be from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Oct. 23 at Seymour Middle School. Open to Jackson County VEX Robotics team girls in grades 7 through 12, the event will feature visits by local women in STEM careers sharing their experiences, hands-on activities, refreshments, giveaways and prizes. 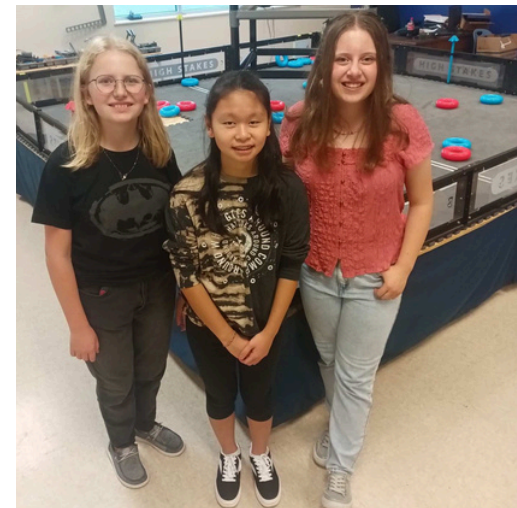
